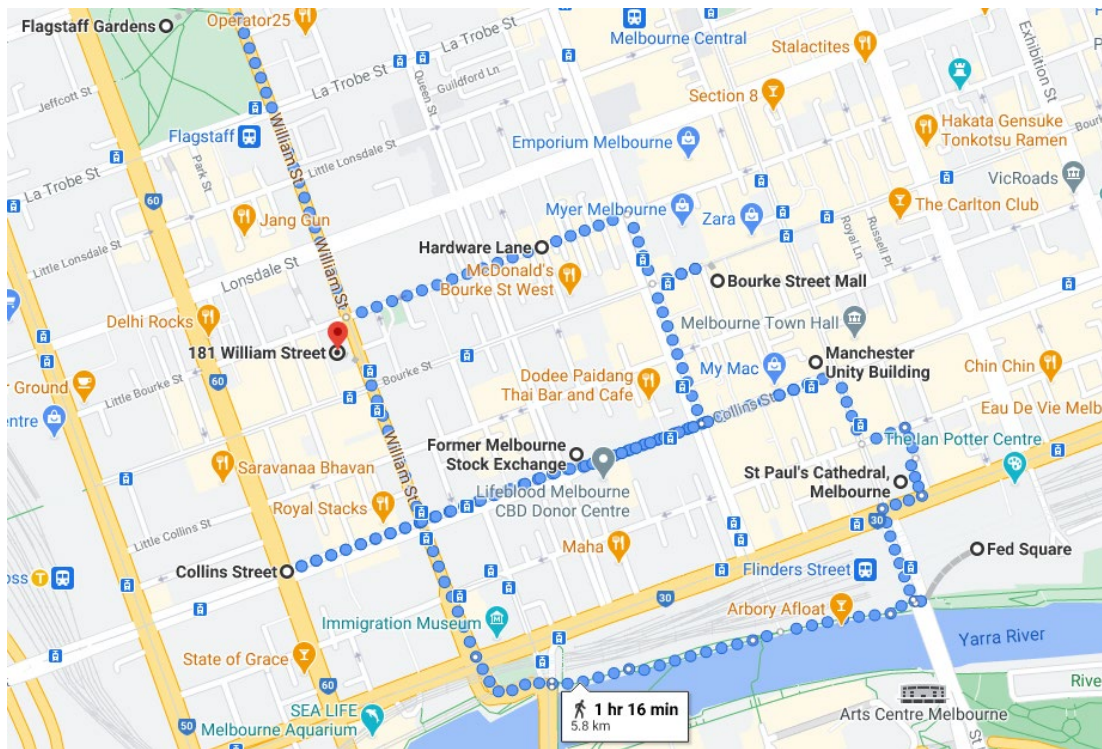


CBW – 181 William Street & 550 Bourke Street



1. Flagstaff Gardens

Flagstaff Gardens is one of the most iconic public gardens in Melbourne. Established in 1862 this garden has an informal style with stretches of lawn that is mainly used as a daily lunch spots of choice for local office workers and weekend picnic spots.

The garden has lots to offer with its bowling club, playground for kids, tennis courts and electric barbecues which contributes to the garden's recreational and informal character.



2. Little Bourke Street – Crombie Lane/ Hardware Lane

Continue down to Little Bourke Street and visit the most upscaled food restaurants and enjoy a nice lunch in-between buildings in unique little cafes. Crombie Lane and Hardware Lane are the two most famous laneways running off Little Bourke where you can enjoy a nice meal outdoors whilst watching office workers and tourist visit one of the most quirky parts of Melbourne.



3. Bourke Street Mall

Bourke Street Mall the heart of the Melbourne CBD and traditionally the hub of the inner city is Melbourne's Major shopping district with exclusive department stores including Myer's flagship store, David Jones flagship store, Zara and H&M. The Bourke Street mall is one of Melbourne's biggest tourist attractions with the street only being a tram spit stop and walking district. The Mall has so much offer including having Melbourne's famous arcades all being connected to Bourke Street including the Melbourne GPO, Royal Arcade and The Strand. A place everyone would need visit when coming to Melbourne!



4. Collins Street

Affectionately known as the 'Paris end', the top of Collins Street is home to luxury retailers including Prada and Louis Vuitton and Gucci alongside heritage buildings and the five-star hotels like Sofitel Melbourne and the Intercontinental hotel.



5. Manchester Unity Building

On the corner of Collins Street you'll find the 1932 Commercial Gothic Manchester Unity Building. Enter the mosaic-tiled arcade for a coffee at the 1932 Cafe & Restaurant and take a tour to see the original interiors and secret rooftop.



6. Former Melbourne Stock Exchange

Continue down Collins Street for the stained glass and Gothic revival gargoyles of the Old Melbourne Stock Exchange (1889-91). On the corner the cathedral-esque sandstone ANZ Gothic Bank (1883-87) by William Wardell boasts gilded ceilings.



7. St Pauls Cathedral

This being one of the most iconic churches in Melbourne - St Paul's Cathedral is the site of the first public Christian services in Melbourne. Take a shortcut through Chapter House Lane and grab a cuppa at Chapter House Coffee.



8. Federation Square

Snap a photo with the odd angles of Fed Square and drop by the Australian Centre for the Moving Image for free exhibitions. Discover local Aboriginal history at the Koorie Heritage Trust and explore contemporary art in the Ian Potter Centre: NGV Australia. Enjoy a nice feed or drink with colleagues after work at a selection of beautiful restaurants that are right in the heart Federation Square.



9. HOME - CBW – 181 William Street & 550 Bourke Street.
